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LIMB COLLECTION STARTS IN APRIL

Public Works will start its very popular limb collection the week of April 14th and end the week of June 16th.



Residents should stack trimmings at the curb by 7:00 am the Monday morning of their designated week with the cut ends facing the street. City crews will collect brush on each street one time only during the schedule collection week. Branches should not be cut into short pieces. Do not put any wire, metal, trash, garden waste or other debris in the brush. This could cause serious injury to the crew and damage the chipper.

Trimmings done by a contractor must be removed by the contractor and not left for city crews to pick up. No stumps or limbs larger than 6 inches in diameter will be taken. If you have questions, call (314) 839-3700, Monday-Friday, 8:00 AM – 4:30 PM



LEEZER NAMED INTERIM CITY MANAGER

Mayor Matt Robinson and the Hazelwood City Council appointed David Leezer as Interim City Manager, effective November 1, 2024. Leezer has served as Assistant City Manager - Economic Development since June of 2022.

He was named to the post upon the retirement of Matt Zimmerman.



He moved to the St. Louis region over 25 years ago and served in a number of local government positions in both St. Louis and St. Charles Counties.

Leezer received both a B.A. and M.A. in Political Science from Eastern Illinois University with an emphasis on Public Administration. He is a Certified Economic Developer (CEcD) and has received the designation of Fellow Member (FM) from the International Economic Development Council (IEDC).

He and his wife, Pat, are the parents of one son - Nathan - who resides in Boston with his wife and son.

The appointment will run until July 1, 2025.

They spoke on various topics ranging from safety, city finances, street repairs, code issues and city services.




LOCAL ELECTIONS

DRUG TAKE BACK DAY



On April 26th, 2025, the City of Hazelwood Police Department will participate in the National Drug Take Back Program. Our collection site once again is in front of the City Hall Complex. We will be collecting between the times of 10am and 2pm.

We are collecting Controlled and non-controlled and over the counter medications.



Ilicit substance such as marijuana or methamphetamine are NOT a part of this initiative.

Needles, sharp objects, liquids or inhalers are not accepted. In addition, we will not collect batteries, vape pens with non-removable batteries.

MODOT PUBLIC MEETINGS

MoDOT hosted an open house at Civic Center East on the proposed improvements to Route 67 (Lindbergh Blvd.) between Missouri Route 367 and Interstate 270. The project includes three separate tranches that will resurface the existing roadway, replace or rehabilitate bridge surfaces and make updates to the corridor's pedestrian infrastructure to meet ADA requirements. The segment that impacts us the most runs from New Halls Ferry to I-270 and will include:

- Resurface approximately four miles of pavement.
- Upgrade the existing sidewalks and curb ramps to meet ADA requirements.
- Construct new sidewalks in front of Phillips 66, Firestone Complete Auto Care, and the utility substation.
- Replace existing entrances to meet ADA requirements.
- Reconstruct traffic signals at Trotterway Dr., Target entrance, North Waterford Dr./Thunderbird Ave., New Florissant Rd., St. Jean St., West Washington St./Charbonier Rd., and Elm Grove Ave.
- Replace the acceleration lane on Lindbergh Blvd. northbound between Taylor Rd. and Elm Grove Rd. that was removed as part of the I-270 improvements.
- Make connection between existing sidewalk along the north side of Lindbergh Blvd. and the existing switchback for the Great Rivers Greenway Sunset Greenway Trail at the bridge east of Patterson Rd.
- Replace all ground mounted and affected overhead corridor signage.

They are anticipating this work to start in the Spring of 2026 and completed by late Fall at an estimated cost of \$11.3 million. FIRE DEPARTMENT AIDING OUR CITIZENS

"Access Life" and an "All Hazard Weather radio are just two of the many community support programs operated by the Hazelwood Fire Department.

Access Life allows the department to place a lockbox outside a residence with a push button code which holds a key for the house. The code will only be available to our dispatchers who will relay the information to the Hazelwood Fire Department when 911 is called. This will allow a first responder access to the home if no other entry point is available. In addition, the Department's Emergency Management team was awarded a grant to purchase an all-hazards weather alerting radio. which includes the batteries, a pillow shaker, and a strobe light to help alert the hearing impaired of impending severe weather at night. The State Emergency Management Agency (SEMA) awarded grant, can help reduce the risk of injury and death during severe weather by providing the all-hazards weather alerting radio, a pillow shaker, and a strobe device to the hearing impaired. To be eligible, the recipient must be a resident of the City of Hazelwood and either they or a member of their family is hearing impaired. EMPLOYEES PARTICIPATE IN FITNESS CHALLENGE

In an effort to promote better health, the City's Wellness Committee began a new program to encourage fitness by employees.

"The idea first came to the city by the Fire Union during contract negotiations last year," stated Interim City Manager David Leezer. "We thought it was such a great idea, we incorporated it into all of our agreements and expanded it to included non-bargaining unit employees."

Liberty Thompson, a Hazelwood resident and Certified Fitness Coach was brought in to teach employees the proper way to workout to avoid injury. She also helped coach the employees during the fitness challenge.

"Our goal is for the employees to use this as a first step for year-round fitness. We recognize a healthy lifestyle benefits both the employee and the city," Leezer added.
