WHAT'S NEW

Communications Coordinator Tim Davidson reported on City news, events, and programs.

The Fire Department's Public Safety Awareness Day event, on May 17, drew a large crowd. The event was hosted as a way of thanking the community for their continued support.

Hazelwood Police Officers will participate in the Torch Run for Special Olympics tomorrow. The officers will run 2.2 miles along Lindbergh Boulevard from Charbonier Road in Florissant to the Hazelwood Post Office. The event raises awareness and funds for Special Olympics Missouri.

A commemorative marker has been installed near the Charbonier Bluff in the St. Stanislaus Historic Conservation Area. The site marks one of Lewis & Clark's stops as recorded in their journal on May 16, 1804. A dedication ceremony will be held on Saturday, May 24, at Charbonier and Aubuchon Roads in St. Stanislaus Park. Mayor Robinson will be one of several national and local dignitaries giving speeches.

CITIZEN HEARINGS AND PRESENTATION OF PETITIONS

Mayor Robinson explained the procedures to be followed during a hearing. He invited anyone desiring to make a comment to come forward at this time.

No one came forward to address the Council.

CITY MANAGER'S STATUS REPORT

Mr. Zimmerman had provided the Council with a report on the request for assistance by Tony Lipinski of 1417 Eagles Way Court relative to erosion caused by storm water drainage and concerns expressed by Dorothy Nardi of 506 Haven Tree Lane regarding code enforcement issues.

Mr. Zimmerman and Public Works Director David Stewart visited the site on Eagles Way Court and met with Mr. Lipinski to discuss the erosion issue, a private property owner/MSD matter. Mr. Stewart then contacted MSD to ask for additional review of the situation. However, MSD has no funding for storm water problems. The cost of the abatement project, estimated to be three figures, and the planning and permitting process would be significant. Therefore, the City is unable to offer assistance.

In response to Mrs. Nardi's code enforcement concerns, staff toured the neighborhood with Mrs. Nardi. Courtesy infraction notices were sent to four of the homes in question. Mrs. Nardi was advised to contact Code Enforcement in the event she has similar concerns in the future.

Mr. Ryan moved, seconded by Mrs. Hendon, to appoint Gerri Kostecki and William Laskowsky to the Hazelwood Commerce Center Community Improvement District Board of Directors. The motion passed unanimously.

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

PRESENTATION BY Mr. Zimmerman stated Jennifer Volk of Unicom Arc., Inc.,
CAMPAIGN COMMITTEE is present to give a presentation on the campaign strategy
& CONSULTANT and contract options.

Mr. Zimmerman stated the City has utilized Unicom's services for past campaigns. There are several issues to consider this evening. First, is whether or not the City or the Campaign Committee is willing to retain a firm to assist with the informational campaign strategy or the advocacy program.

Ms. Volk stated Unicom specializes in working with public organizations on educating the community and on referendum campaigns. A proposal has been prepared for the City's proposed referendums which includes an advocacy or "vote yes" campaign and an informational campaign. Ms. Volk noted the City is permitted to provide funding for an informational campaign to educate the community on the challenges it's facing and the services it provides. The campaign strategy has three integrated components: in-person contact via a door to door canvass program, direct mail, and social media. She compared the integrated strategy to a three-legged stool stating without one of the campaign components or legs the campaign or stool easily falls over. Person to person contact is an important piece of the strategy because people trust information most when it's received from friends, family, or acquaintances. The majority of this contact would be through community meetings. Direct mail also remains a very effective method of communication. The proposal is to include an informational brochure with the City newsletter and to send an additional mailer reminding residents to vote and educating them on the issues. Social media is effective because more and more people are getting information from the internet. The proposal is to create content for the City's website, to work with social media accounts such as Facebook where there's the largest audience, and to do an e-mail campaign. The advantage to the social media component is the investment provides for development of an effective network that will be available for ongoing communication efforts. Ms. Volk stated the advocacy campaign proposal is separate because it's typically handled by a volunteer committee.

Mrs. Singleton asked how the firm would gather e-mail data.

Ms. Volk replied data would most likely be gathered from the City's existing lists. She suggested individual Council members could send a mailing to their ward stating an e-mail campaign is being launched and asking residents to sign up.

It was noted that Unicom was retained for the annexation campaign in 1995, the parks and storm water tax campaign in 1998, and the street bond campaign in 2004.

Mr. Zimmerman stated, because the vast majority of this work is informational in nature, the City could approve the contract. However, the campaign committee met yesterday and would prefer to handle the contract and do the fundraising. Dependent upon fundraising results, the committee may ask the City to contribute toward the informational campaign. The amount is undetermined at this time and would depend on the services used. A formal contribution request would be made.

Mr. O'Keefe suggested two separate contracts to avoid any impression of comingling or fund diversion.

Ms. Volk stated there are typically two contracts, one with the city and one with the advocacy committee.

The Council agreed to utilize the services of Unicom.

Mr. O'Keefe stated, once the terms are finalized, any legislation required to authorize a contract would be drafted.

CAMPAIGN UPDATE Mr. Zimmerman discussed campaign issues stating the Council has had extensive dialogues about the need to increase operating revenue.

Revenues have not kept pace with expenditures and the City went into deficit spending in fiscal year 2012, with higher levels in fiscal year 2013. Fiscal year 2014 is projected to have a slightly lower deficit than 2013. However, it will be necessary to incur additional expenses in fiscal year 2015 such as road salt at the cost of approximately \$120,000. At this time, the proposed fiscal year 2015 budget has a \$1.5 million deficit. Based on the Council's direction, \$1.3 million in potential utility tax revenue was included in the proposed budget. Since Council discussions at the April 30 budget work session, the fire district subcommittee met with representatives from the fire districts and learned Robertson Fire Protection District will ask for a 50 cent tax increase on the August ballot and Florissant Valley Fire Protection District will ask for a 40 cent tax increase. If both of these referendums are approved, the City's payments to the districts would increase \$1 million and if the six percent residential utility tax is restored there would be little change in the existing budget deficit situation. Therefore, as discussed previously, the question is whether or not the Council wishes to present a fire sales tax referendum to the voters in addition to the utility tax referendum. A quarter cent fire sales tax is estimated to provide annual revenue of \$1.1 million. A six percent utility tax would cost the average homeowner approximately \$10 per month. For some homeowners it would be more and for some, particularly senior citizens, it would be less. The impact of a fire sales tax on a Hazelwood resident is indeterminate because it's dependent on their purchasing levels. A large amount of the sales tax would be paid by nonresidents who shop here. Mr. Zimmerman stated the budget would be adopted

by July 1, as required by the Code, and would be reviewed after the August 5 election. Mr. Zimmerman stated in addition to the referendum question, there's the question of whether or not to offer a senior citizen rebate in the event the residential utility tax is restored. A full rebate would reduce revenue by approximately \$200,000. He stated the Council could consider an income restriction for the rebate. A decision on the rebate could be made before or after the referendum. The Campaign Committee recommended seeking both referendums and offering the senior citizen rebate. To make up for the decrease in potential utility tax revenue from the full rebate, Mr. Zimmerman suggested the Council consider seeking a seven percent residential rate and increasing the non-residential rate from six percent to seven percent which would net an additional \$400,000. Finally, he stated the Council has multiple options to consider prior to second reading of the referendum bills later on this agenda.

In response to Mrs. Stroker's inquiry, Mr. Zimmerman explained the rebate process. The senior citizen would submit all of their previous year's bills during a specified month, such as January, and a full rebate would be issued if the age or age/income guidelines were met. In addition, rebates would only be made for submittals received during the month specified.

Mr. O'Keefe advised, if the Council decides to revise the referendum to include an increase in the non-residential utility tax rate, the Council must decide whether to combine it on the ballot with the residential utility tax proposition or make it a separate ballot proposition. In addition, adding the non-residential tax increase to the draft legislation is a substantive change. Therefore, new legislation would need to be drafted and a special meeting would have to be held for emergency passage of the ordinance in order to meet the May 27 election certification deadline.

Utility tax options were discussed. A one percent non-residential increase would generate revenue of approximately \$600,000. For residential, each one percent generates approximately \$220,000 in revenue. Full senior rebates would total approximately \$200,000. Therefore, a six percent rate with no senior rebate would provide about the same revenue as a seven percent rate with a full senior rebate.

Mrs. Singleton suggested simplifying the referendum by seeking only the residential utility tax at seven percent which would meet the City's needs.

Mr. Aubuchon suggested the non-residential rate should be the same as the residential rate.

After additional Council discussion, Mr. Zimmerman stated he understands the Council wants a utility tax referendum which the Campaign Committee recommends calling "Proposition U," a fire sales tax referendum which the committee recommends naming "Proposition S" for public safety, and a special meeting to be held this Friday or this weekend to pass an emergency ordinance calling for an election for Proposition U which would authorize a seven percent utility tax for both residential and non-residential

properties. The aspects of the rebate program would be presented at the June 4 regular Council meeting.

Mrs. Singleton asked if the City would have to impose the entire seven percent.

Mr. Zimmerman responded an amount not to exceed seven percent could be imposed. He stated the budget would be reevaluated after the election and appropriate actions would be taken.

Mr. O'Keefe asked if the Council wishes to submit the residential and non-residential tax increases in a single proposition. He questioned tying the non-residential tax to the residential tax noting commercial property owners aren't voters.

After additional discussions, Mr. O'Keefe requested a recess. There were no objections.

RECESS/RECONVENE The meeting was recessed for 10 minutes and reconvened.

Mr. O'Keefe explained he checked the state statute which requires a four day notice, exclusive of weekends, for meetings related to tax increases. He stated the notice is required for meetings relative to implementing a tax increase and he doesn't believe a meeting to call an election for a tax increase is implementing an increase.

Mayor Robinson stated he understands the Council is opposed to placing a third issue on the ballot and supports amending the bill for the residential utility tax to authorize a tax not to exceed seven percent rather than six percent. Also, the Council wishes to change the name of the utility tax proposition to Proposition U and the name of the fire department sales tax proposition to Proposition S. In addition, the Council wishes to consider legislation for a full senior citizen utility tax rebate during a future Council meeting.

Mrs. Stroker moved, seconded by Mr. Ryan, to amend Bill 4445 by changing the tax rate from six percent to seven percent and the title of the proposition from Proposition 1 to Proposition U. The motion passed unanimously.

There were no objections and Bill 4445, as amended, was read by title only:

Mr. Zimmerman interjected staff was asked whether or not property owners would continue to pay less in taxes than they paid in 2008, which was the City's high point for revenues, if the proposition passes. As a basis for research, staff chose one house in each ward and looked at what was paid in property taxes. Those property owners are

paying anywhere from \$117 to \$586 less per year in total taxes than they paid in 2008 and they would continue to pay less if the utility tax proposition passes. He stated he believes this is an important point to consider as adoption of Bill 4445 is contemplated.
