

**CITY OF HAZELWOOD
REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING
MAY 6, 2015**

CALL TO ORDER

A regular meeting of the Hazelwood City Council was called to order by Mayor Matthew G. Robinson at 7:30 p.m. on Wednesday, May 6, 2015, in the Council Chambers of Hazelwood City Hall, 415 Elm Grove Lane.

Mayor Robinson asked those present to join in a moment of silent meditation followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

AGENDA

There being no amendments proposed, Mrs. Singleton moved, seconded by Mr. Taylor, the adoption of the agenda as printed. The motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Zimmerman requested the addition of a closed session to the consent agenda to discuss proposals for a negotiated contract.

Mr. Todd moved, seconded by Mr. Ryan, to amend the consent agenda by the addition of a closed session to discuss proposals for a negotiated contract. The motion passed unanimously.

The motion passed unanimously and the consent agenda, including a closed meeting immediately following the regular meeting to consult with the City Attorney in accordance with the provisions of RSMo 610.021(1) and to discuss proposals for a negotiated contract in accordance with the provisions of 610.021(12), was adopted.

Mr. Ryan moved, seconded by Mr. Taylor, to approve the minutes of the April 15 regular and closed Council meetings and the April 22 Council work session, as submitted. The motion passed unanimously.

SPECIAL ORDER OF BUSINESS

WHAT'S NEW

Communications Coordinator Tim Davidson reported on City news, events, and programs.

Raineri Construction has been hired to begin the McDonnell Boulevard overpass enhancement project. Completion is scheduled for July 16. A six foot fence will be installed across both sides of the bridge and the area will be landscaped. The improvements should generate a positive image of the City. Eighty percent of the project will be funded by a federal grant.

Special thanks go to the Industrial Development Authority for picking up the tab for the Business Appreciation Dinner held last week. The event attracted a capacity crowd and gave guests an opportunity to network.

The Police Department will be out in force from May 1 to May 12 as part of the nationwide Youth Alcohol Enforcement "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" campaign. May is traditionally the month for celebrating prom and graduation. Police officers will aggressively look for any youth driving drunk and will arrest them. The department will also participate in the "Click It or Ticket" campaign, from May 18 to May 31, to crackdown on violators of the seat belt law. According to statistics, six out of 10 people involved in traffic accidents in Missouri are found unbuckled at the crash site.

Last week, Hazelwood firefighters completed four 10-hour days of ROCO training on each shift. The annual training included high-angle rescue (off a tower), low-angle rescue (off a roadway or in a creek), and confined space rescue.

The Green Committee partnered with Miss Hazelwood Brianna Barr in organizing Hazelwood West High School students for a litter pickup this past Saturday. They met at the intersection of Dunn/Brown Roads and Utz Lane to collect trash. Students who volunteered earned community service hours required for graduation.

After collecting 73 tons of recyclable items at last year's Recycle Day event, the City is hosting its 5th annual Recycle Day on June 6 at St. Louis Outlet Mall from 9:00 am to 3:00 p.m. Most electronics and appliances with a power cord or that run on batteries will be accepted, with the exception of TVs.

The Community Enrichment Commission is hosting the 12th annual Community Art Fair on June 6, from 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m., at the Community Center. Local artists age 16 and over are encouraged to participate by submitting paintings or drawings in oil, watercolor, acrylic, charcoal, pastels, pencil, or mixed media. Cash prizes will be awarded in each category.

APRIL 7 ELECTION CERTIFIED RESULTS Mrs. Wolf reported the certified results of the April 7 election.

Mayor Robinson received 2,229 votes or 97 percent of the vote. Proposition P received 2,204 yes votes or 77 percent of the vote and 606 no votes or 23 percent of the vote.

EMPLOYEE SERVICE AWARD Police Chief Gregg Hall presented Sergeant Norman Mars with a 20 year service award as his biography was read.

There were no objections and Proclamation 1514 was read.

Mr. Ryan moved, seconded by Mrs. Singleton, the adoption of Proclamation 1514 designating the week of May 10 through May 16, 2015 as "Police Week 2015" and publicly saluting our law enforcement officers for their countless hours of dedicated service and calling upon all citizens to observe this week with appropriate activities commemorating police officers both past and present. The motion passed unanimously.

CITIZEN HEARINGS AND PRESENTATION OF PETITIONS

Mayor Robinson explained the procedures to be followed during a hearing. He invited anyone desiring to make a comment to come forward at this time.

No one came forward to address the Council.

PUBLIC HEARINGS

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| PETITION FOR SUBDIVISION 7208 & 7222 NORTH LINDBERGH & 327 TAYLOR RD. | Mayor Robinson called to order the public hearing to consider the petition for subdivision of 7208 North Lindbergh Boulevard, 7222 North Lindbergh Boulevard, and 327 Taylor Road to adjust the lots' boundaries and dedicate an easement. |
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City Planner Earl Bradfield reported the site is in a C-2 General Commercial District. Surrounding sites are zoned R-4 Single-Family Dwelling District, C-3 Highway Commercial District, and C-2 General Commercial District. The property owner proposes to demolish the portion of the building where the Missouri Driver Examination Office is currently located and to reconstruct the parking lot. There are no plans for additions to the building. The existing cross access easement would be vacated sometime in the future. Total parking requirement is 215 spaces and the petitioner proposes to provide 185 spaces which represents a 14 percent reduction in the required number of spaces. Per Section 405.595 of the Zoning Regulations, up to a 25 percent reduction for mixed use developments may be approved by the Zoning Administrator. Approval of the reduction is recommended because the grocery store at the site is an international non-traditional store and doesn't attract as many vehicles as a traditional grocery store.

Michael Mueller of Civil Engineer and Design Consultants, the engineers for the project, reviewed the history of the site. He stated the lots with Cargo Bay, Holiday Inn Express, and Calvert's Express Auto Service and Tire would not change. In the future, the cross access easement that runs across the property to the bridge will be vacated and a new easement will be dedicated.

In response to Mr. Aubuchon's questions, Mr. Mueller stated parking would be reconfigured with head-in spaces and there would be a main roadway behind the parking spaces.

Jack Davis of JDS Hazelwood, the property owner, explained where the roadway would be located once the portion of the building is demolished. Due to the median, access at the west Taylor Road entrance would be right-in right-out only. They contacted MoDOT about removing the median, but were denied. Full access from Taylor Road is available at the east end of the site. Mr. Davis stated they have submitted a permit application for a pedestrian sidewalk across the bridge to tie into the existing Walgreen's sidewalk. In addition, the sidewalks along the front of the site would be redone. He explained the

landscaping plan. He stated curbing, lighting, and storm sewers would be installed and the parking lot would be asphalted and sloped to improve stormwater drainage. Mr. Davis stated currently motorists cut through the parking lot at high speeds. The new site layout should eliminate this and provide a safer environment. Mr. Davis stated they have leases with the businesses currently located in the portion of the building to be demolished. The North County Intergroup Office has already moved to another area on the site and the state office is expected to move at the end of this month.

Mr. Taylor asked if the bridge would be straightened.

Mr. Davis replied, with the demolition, the 90 degree turn before the bridge will be removed. He added, after the demolition, a new finish will be applied to the building and the frontage will be improved.

In response to comments by Mr. Ryan, Mr. Davis stated ingress/egress won't change. He explained the site currently doesn't appeal to retail tenants due to poor access. By the time motorists on Lindbergh Boulevard see the center, they've already passed Taylor Road. With the improvements, it should be more easily apparent that the site can be accessed from Elm Grove Avenue. He stated there are no plans to reorient the building to face Lindbergh Boulevard at this time.

Mayor Robinson asked if anyone present wished to speak in favor of or in opposition to the proposal.

No one spoke in favor of or in opposition to the proposal and Mayor Robinson declared the hearing closed.

Mrs. Wolf read the City Plan Commission motion "to recommend approval to the City Council for a petition for subdivision located at 7208 and 7222 North Lindbergh Boulevard and 327 Taylor Road located on the north side of Taylor Road approximately 750 feet east of Lindbergh Boulevard for petition for subdivision to approve a final plat that adjusts the boundaries of three lots and dedicates a cross access easement in a C-2 General Commercial Zoning District." She stated the motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Aubuchon moved, seconded by Mr. Todd, to concur with the City Plan Commission recommendation to authorize the subdivision of 7208 and 7222 North Lindbergh Boulevard and 327 Taylor Road and to place the draft bill on this agenda for introduction. The motion passed unanimously and the bill was added to the agenda as item 17.a.

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| SLUP PETITION 9144 PERSHALL ROAD | Mayor Robinson called to order the public hearing to consider the petition by Center for Life Solutions, Inc., for a Special Land Use Permit for a drug abuse treatment facility at 9144 Pershall Road. |
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Mr. Bradfield reported the site is in an industrial area, far from residential areas, making it a good location for the proposed use. Available parking is sufficient. The proposed hours of operation are Monday through Friday, 6:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m., and Saturday, 7:00 a.m. to 10:00 a.m. The proposed use is consistent with the Comprehensive Plan.

John Pennington, partner of Savoy Investments, LLC, the owners under contract to purchase the property, stated the treatment facility is currently on Dunn Road near Village Square Center. He stated they felt it best for the facility to have its own free-standing building. He stated Center for Life Solutions is one of three not-for-profit drug rehabilitation facilities in the state and is addressing a very important problem. Mr. Pennington stated the general contractor will be Raineri Construction and Rataj-Krueger is the architect.

Robert Brown, program director and network administrator for Center for Life Solutions, discussed the services they provide. The agency offers medicated assisted treatment with medications such as methadone, individual and family counseling, group education, community outreach, drug testing, and more. Substance abuse disorders, such as opiate and prescription drug addiction, render a person's life dysfunctional. Eventually, they focus on nothing but their addiction and other major life areas become neglected. The goal of the agency is to support the individual, to help them put their life back in order, and to assist them in becoming drug free. This is accomplished by building self-esteem and restoring structure in their lives. Services are provided regardless of race, disability, residency, gender, or religion. The agency's mission is to improve the quality of life one session at a time. When an individual first comes to Center for Life Solutions, they're assigned a counselor who helps them to devise a treatment plan. The plan addresses not only the drug addiction, but the underlying issues that led them to the addiction such as family or legal problems. Mr. Brown stated the company has been in business for 10 years and has four to five hundred clients. Current staffing is forty to fifty. With the expansion, new jobs may be added. Clientele consists of ordinary people who have made poor decisions. The agency receives funding through a contract with the Department of Behavioral Health's Division of Alcohol and Drug Abuse and the United States District Court of Eastern Missouri. In addition, there are a small number of private pay clients. With respect to security, the agency employs two licensed security guards and one is on site at all times. There are 15 to 20 surveillance cameras and the site is monitored by ADT 24 hours a day.

Mayor Robinson asked about the registration process.

Mr. Brown responded registration can take from two days to two weeks depending upon the waiting list. The agency accepts walk-in clients as well as referrals from the courts, the Department of Family Services, and other social services.

Mayor Robinson asked if anyone present wished to speak in favor of or in opposition to the proposal.

No one spoke in favor of or in opposition to the proposal and Mayor Robinson declared the hearing closed.

Mrs. Wolf read the City Plan Commission motion “to recommend approval to the City Council for a Petition for Special Land Use Permit for a drug abuse treatment facility located in an I-1 Light Industrial zoning district at 9144 Pershall Road, Hazelwood, MO 63042.” She stated the motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Aubuchon moved, seconded by Mr. Taylor, to concur with the City Plan Commission recommendation to grant the Special Land Use Permit for a drug abuse treatment facility at 9144 Pershall Road and to place the draft bill on this agenda for introduction. The motion passed unanimously and the bill was added to the agenda as item 17.b.

HCC CID APPOINTMENTS Mayor Robinson nominated Gerri Kostecki and Glenn Mitchell for appointment to the Hazelwood Commerce Center Community Improvement District Board of Directors.

Mr. Todd moved, seconded by Mr. Ryan, to appoint Gerri Kostecki and Glenn Mitchell to act as successor directors to the Hazelwood Commerce Center Community Improvement District Board of Directors with terms expiring April 18, 2018. The motion passed unanimously.

BOARD/COMMISSION APPOINTMENTS Mr. Ryan nominated Bev Paulson for reappointment to the Parks and Recreation Board, Tom Oswald for reappointment to the Board of Adjustment and Architectural Board of Review, and Bill Young for reappointment to the City Plan Commission.

Mrs. Singleton nominated Marilyn Placek for reappointment to the Community Enrichment Commission.

Mr. Todd moved, seconded by Mr. Taylor, to make the preceding appointments. The motion passed unanimously.

Mrs. Wolf will invite the reappointed board and commission members to the May 20 Council meeting to receive their oaths of office and commission certificates.

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

FIREWORKS DISPLAY Parks and Recreation Superintendent Doug Littlefield reported staff recommends authorization of a contract with J & M Displays, Inc., for the 2015 pyro-musical fireworks display at a cost not to exceed \$24,000.

Staff advertised for bids and one bid was received from J & M Displays. This is the same company that provided the City's last five displays. The bid includes a full sound package with a disc jockey prior to the event and music during the display. Approximately 80 additional 2½ to 4 inch shells and 3,800 additional multi-shots are

also included. Funds in the amount of \$27,000 have been included in next year's budget for the display and other associated costs such as port-a-potties.

Mr. Todd moved, seconded by Mr. Taylor, to concur with the staff recommendation to authorize the contract for the 2015 pyro-musical fireworks display and to place the draft bill on this agenda for introduction. The motion passed unanimously and the bill was added to the agenda as item 17.c.

SALES TAX LEVY Mr. Zimmerman reported staff recommends the Council levy the quarter cent general sales tax approved by the voters on April 7.

Upon Council approval, the ordinance would then be sent to the State of Missouri and collection of the tax would begin in October.

Mr. Taylor moved, seconded by Mr. Ryan, to concur with the staff recommendation to levy the quarter cent sales tax and to place the draft bill on this agenda for introduction. The motion passed unanimously and the bill was added to the agenda as item 17.d.
